Letter from our WIC President

Dear Women in the Church,

May I tell you a story. Thirty-one years ago God blessed our family with a precious baby girl. She was a teeny little thing with long dark hair, beautiful brown eyes and an extra chromosome. Our world was forever changed...what we couldn't grasp at that moment was...it would be for better. This frail little girl entrusted to us needed some intensive help. Her muscle tone was terrible and she wasn't very responsive. I, as her mother, began to research how to improve her development. God in His sovereign mercy directed my efforts, and I found an intensive program that we could learn and administer to our baby daughter. God moved mountains for us. Our daughter was the youngest child ever enrolled in this program (the waiting list was extremely long). We attended our first training session in Philadelphia and returned home to build our own program. We worked with our baby girl 8- 10 hours a day, seven days a week, for three years. It was an arduous task, but we were God driven. We had volunteers coming in to help us with "patterning" three times a day, and we had an active five year old little boy who needed attention and love. Well, God laid in it on the hearts of the women in our little Campground Baptist Church, to come alongside us and help as they could. Many of our congregation were elderly, but boy they could cook! And that is exactly what they did- one day a week- for a year we enjoyed the blessing of their love and great cooking. I will never forget those women. They took seriously Paul's call- "contributing to the needs of the saints, practicing hospitality". I take it seriously. It helped us to help our precious.... Melissa.

Your WIC council has instituted a new program. Our church kitchen has a new freezer and we want to make use of it. We presently have eight "care meals" frozen and available for use. Shirley Roe is monitoring the meals and will alert us when we need to replenish them. They will be used to minister to the sick, the bereaved, and the needy. When your council team leader calls you, please be available to cook. You will touch a life, maybe a family's life, in a very special way. Maybe in a way that will never be forgotten.

Bill and Wendy DePury with Intervarsity in the Deep South

- 1) Thank God for more than a dozen International UWF students who are partnered with American families here in Pensacola. Pray that these open doors of friendship will also be open doors to share the Gospel.
- 2) Praise God for Matthew, new staff @ Tulane, and his opportunities to reach students for Jesus.
- 3) Ask our prayers for a new work on Xavier, New Orleans campus, even though it is a Catholic college.
- 4) Thank God for Jason, staff @ Jackson State, working with his core team to lead Bible study in three dorms.
- 5) Asks us to pray that International students @ Mississippi College and University of Memphis will be drawn to the Lord Jesus.

Beau and Jennifer - sensitive country

- 1) Ask our prayers for their support. In the face of declining support over the last 20 months, MTW set up a matching gift scholarship—a 1:1 match on new one-time gifts up to \$4,000 through the end of 2011. They have also set up a 2:1 matching fund for new or increased monthly pledges up to \$3,000 through the end of 2011.
- 2) Ask prayers for establishment of Church Partnerships focused on the islands. Partner churches would take increased interest in God's work, help recruit new workers, encourage church planters and new congregations, and above all, pray for the islands.
- 3) Praise God for a vibrant women's ministry in the islands. Pray for a partnership with the Women in the Church at either the local, regional, or national level.
- 4) Pray for growth and development of Tanduk Coffee Company as a source of funding and legal entry for them into their country.

Steve and Jenna Lammers praise God for outreaches at the University of Florida with Reformed University Ministries.

- 1) Pray for large group studies on the Gospel of Mark.
- 2) Pray for wisdom for 36 small group student-leaders of small groups who study Scriptures together.
- 3) Pray for one-to-one ministry. Steve alone meets with 10-12 students per week for such things as leadership training, counseling, and evangelism.
- 4) Pray that new intern, Vinni, will grow through his study program and outreach to freshmen and "fringe" students.
- 5) Pray for adjustment of their family to new home and school after their move closer to campus this summer.

Caribbean Christian Centre for the Deaf newsletter reports that they have had to reduce their staff and cut back on programs because of the economic slump, yet they are confident the Lord will provide what they need when they need it. At the same time, praise God that three graduates from Knockpatrick campus have completed their studies at in the U. S. and are raising support to return to Jamaica as a pastor, counselor, and as a helper in the schools. All are stepping out in faith for the lost Deaf in their country.

Alberto and Judy Nunez of Friends of the Disabled Latin America

- 1) Praise God that a container of wheelchairs has been released from Bolivian Customs.
- 2) Pray for resolution of a tax problem in Bolivia that has been in negotiation for a long time.
- 3) Praise for being able to ship some containers with wheelchairs, braces, walkers, lap robes, and wheelchair bags to Bolivia, Peru, and Uruguay.
- 4) Ask the Lord to provide more children's wheelchairs—a great need not being met. Cost: \$200.

David and Jan 1) Praise God for 44 women who came to English class and for the new "Tea and Talk" conversation class—both vehicles for making friendships with a view to presenting the Gospel.

- 2) Pray for the Enterprise Women's leadership team as they plan a retreat for next October.
- 3) Pray that God would open the eyes of all their Muslim friends to see the truth and come to believe in Jesus.

Jaime and Irene Vieira 1) Are thankful to have traveled to Portugal in September to preach and teach around Lisbon.

- 2) A team of Christian doctors also donated medical care for them: Pray for Irene's painful back and Filipe showing signs of autism along with his OCD. They also rested.
- 3) Praise, for Dr. Mary Joe will visit Vieiras in December to sign legal documents that will enable them to protect Filipe's legal rights, when needed.

"The Greater Work"

"Operation World"

The information listed below was copied from the book "Operation World" which can be found in our library. This book was written for all Christians who want to obey the last great command of our Lord. Each monthly newsletter will provide information for a country where the PCA has missionaries and may also include the missionaries that we are currently supporting at Pinewoods. Please note that the information for a particular country is only a very small portions of what is in the book. Please read and pray remembering that prayer is an act of warfare. When we seek to reach people with the Gospel we can expect much opposition from the evil one. As Oswald Chambers has said, "Prayer does not fit us for the greater work, prayer is the greater work."



The Islands of Indonesia

Each major island or island archipelago is so unique and complex that some of the more significant are handled separately - from west to east.

Sumatra

Geography

Area 473,000 sq km. The world's sixth-largest island. A vast potential storehouse of minerals and agricultural produce, but much is unamed jungle, swamp and volcanic mountains, often with poor soil and poorer surface communications. Irresponsible exploitation of natural resources is causing serious environmental damage.

Population 48,812,000 in 10 provinces: Bengkulu; Jambi; Lampung; Riau; Riau Islands; Bangka-Belitung; North, South and West

Sumatra; and the special autonomous district of Aceh. 103 people/sq km.

Peoples

Major indigenous peoples: Aceh, Batak, Minangkabau, Lampung-Komering and many Melayu (Malay) sub-groups such as Deli, Riau, Jambi and Palembang, plus many others. There are also many Javanese, Chinese and other peoples who are not indigenous.

Religion

Official figures (2005): Muslim 87%; Christian 10% (Protestant 9%, Catholic 1%); Buddhist 2%; Hindu 1%.

Sumatra is prone to natural disasters, since it lies in a geologically volatile area. The earthquake and tsunami in 2004 killed over 200,000 - mostly in Aceh - and rendered 500,000 people homeless. Further tragedies are inevitable. Meanwhile, ruthless logging threatens the environment, the traditional lifestyles of many peoples and a large number of critically endangered species. Pray that wise government will curtail the destruction occurring in the name of greed and that responsible planning will minimize loss of life in future earthquakes and floods.

Sumatra is the largest unevangelized island on earth. Most of its largest people groups are staunchly Muslim; many others practice folk Islam. If it were a nation, only nine other nations would have more unreached peoples. There are many spiritual strongholds to be broken.

Of its 49 unreached peoples, at least 29 have no indigenous church and eight still have no known gospel workers. Most Muslims have had little or no exposure to the person of Jesus, and most peoples have never had a long-term gospel presence in their midst. Some have access to a NT, the JESUS film, Christian radio, audio ministry or even local witness, but many have none of these.

Christianity is strong among formerly animist peoples, the only areas where the Dutch colonial administration allowed mission work. These are:

- a) *The Batak-Nias people cluster* consisting of 13 peoples and totalling 9.4 million, the vast majority of them in Sumatra. The Bataks (Toba, Dairi, Karo and Simalungun) are all 70% or more Christian. Most of the Angkola and Mandailing are Muslim with only a small minority of Christians. The Batak are a dynamic and successful people who have migrated all over Indonesia, yet their ethnic pride and strong adherence to old customs combine with frequent enemy with Sumatran Muslim peoples to hinder Batak's effectiveness as cross-cultural witnesses. The Nias and Mentawai live on islands off Sumatra's west coast. Lutherans are by far the largest denomination, but sadly, nominalism prevails and animistic and occultic practices are widespread.
- b) *The Chinese* are in most cities, but in Medan, capital of North Sumatra, Chinese are up to 20% of the population and operate 60% of the businesses. There are Buddhists, Confucians, even Hindus as well as many Christians. Significant ministry still occurs among the Chinese. Pray that these Christians may experience revival and break out of their ethnic cocoons to become effective witnesses to the non-Christian peoples around them.

Pray for the unreached:

- a) *The 3.5 million Aceh people* are very strongly Muslim and have been influential in spreading Islam to other Indonesian peoples. Unrest and violence associated with an independence movement plagued the province for over 300 years. A peace treaty was signed in 2005, with Aceh made into a special territory having significant autonomy. The devastation of the 2004 tsunami drew many Christian aid and relief organizations to the area. The differing approaches of agencies for demonstrating God's love while offering assistance caused some problems with the strict Muslims; some encouraging fruit has come from these efforts. The Aceh NT was published in 1992.
- b) *The smaller people groups of northern Sumatra.* Simeulue Island is 100% Muslim. It was hard hit by the tsunami, but aid has brought roads, an airport, a hospital, new homes and dissatisfaction with a subsistence lifestyle. The Gayo are folk-Islamic and grow coffee high in the mountains. The folk-Islamic Tamiang have no known believers. The Mandailing are proud to have almost no Christians among their group, while the Angkola group is 3-5% Christian.
- c) *The Minangkabau-Rejang people cluster.* The 8.1 million matrilineal Minangkabau of West Sumatra are well educated, widely travelled and successful - as well as being devoted Muslims. There may be 500-1000 believers at most. The 350,000 Rejang and the 300,000 Kerinci practice folk Islam, with magic having great influence. They have little to no Christian resources in their languages, and believers between them number less than 200.
- d) *The Malay-related peoples of Eastern and Southern Sumatra,* including the Deli (2.1m), Melayu Riau (2.1m) and Jambi (1m). There are several dozen believers among the first two groups, but these have almost all moved away from their communities or distanced themselves culturally. The Jambi are among Indonesia's least-evangelized people with only a handful of Christians, all of whom live outside the Jambi region.
- e) *The Muslim peoples of Central and South Sumatra* are all without a congregation of believers, despite increasing outreach. There are a handful of believers among the Batun, Bengkulu, Enim and Lembak, but none at all among the Kaur, Lematang, Ogan and Semendo.
- f) *The peoples of Lampung in the south.* The indigenous peoples are resentful of newcomers from Java. No churches are known among the indigenous Lampung Pemanggil (500,000), Komering (450,000), Lampung Abung (180,000) or Lampung Pujian (100,000). There are churches among the many Java transmigrants in the area, and some ministry among these groups. Translation of the Bible into Lampung is underway.

Don Richardson came to Pinewoods! Wasn't it wonderful to hear his story of God's work among the Sawi people? Right now, you can read his *Peace Child*, *Lords of the Earth*, and *Eternity in Their Hearts*! (266 is the number for "Missions.") We also recently ordered the *Peace Child* DVD and Don's book, *Secrets of the Koran*.



Eternity in Their Hearts tells the stories of over 20 people groups in very different parts of the world. Each of these clans or tribes or ethnic groups has some cultural compass that points to the Gospel. For example, the Chinese people paste red strips of paper on the two sides and over the top of their door frames on the outsides of their houses as a part of their New Year celebration. On these strips, they write sayings wishing prosperity and peace for their household. Doesn't this sound something like the Children of Israel putting blood on the doorposts on the night of the Exodus? Missionaries have used this example to intrigue Chinese people with the Gospel of Christ's blood covering those who believe in Him to give them life and spiritual prosperity.

God has left a memory of His character and nature in many cultures around the world. His grace! Then, when a missionary comes to preach the Gospel, the people's hearts are ready to listen. Some have read this book, but this is one to re-read. If you have not yet read it, it's a classic that will leave you praising God for His kindness!

For our ladies and young women, we ordered Nancy Lee DeMoss's books, *Lies Women Believe* and *Lies Young Women Believe*. I may just have to read one of these before they go on the shelf, they sound so good!

Come, Thou Long Expected Jesus by Nancy Guthrie will get you ready for Christmas!

Pastor Tim Keller's work is a favorite here at Pinewoods. Coming soon are two DVD series, *Prodigal God* and *The Gospel in Life*. This is a special note for Life Group Leaders, but families with older children may enjoy using these for evening prayers, too.

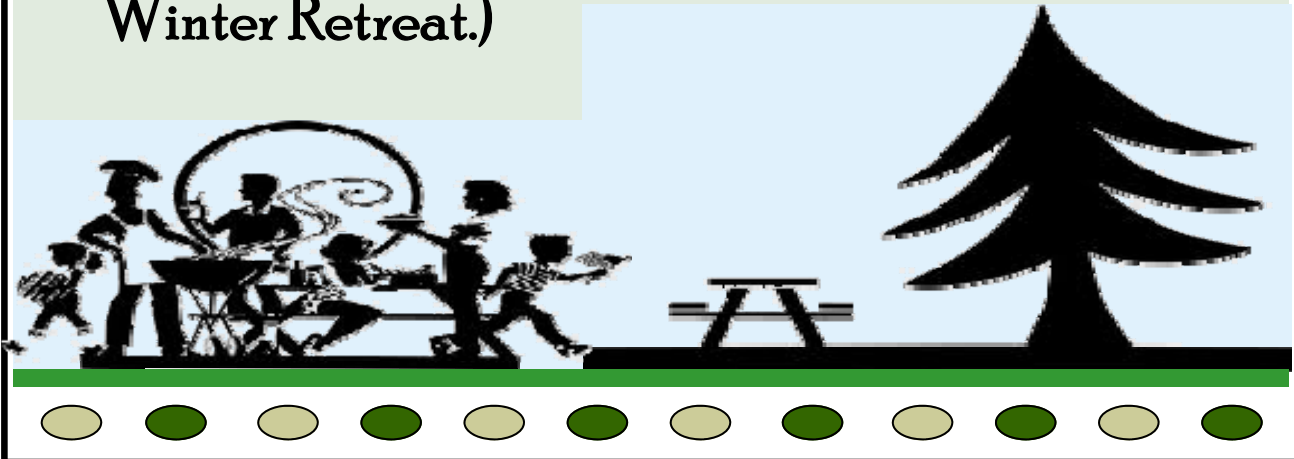
